

NFL Training Camps Dolphin Marino (

Dan Marino extended an "olive branch" to the Miami Dolphins, who quickly snapped it in half.

Marino, Miami's record-setting quarterback, walked out of training camp July 25, wanting his contract renegotiated. On Friday, Marino's agent, Marvin Demoff, said the quarterback would return immediately if the dispute was submitted to binding arbitration.

It was seen as an "olive branch" from Marino — the first move in the week-long impasse over what is expected to result in one of the most lucrative contracts in football.

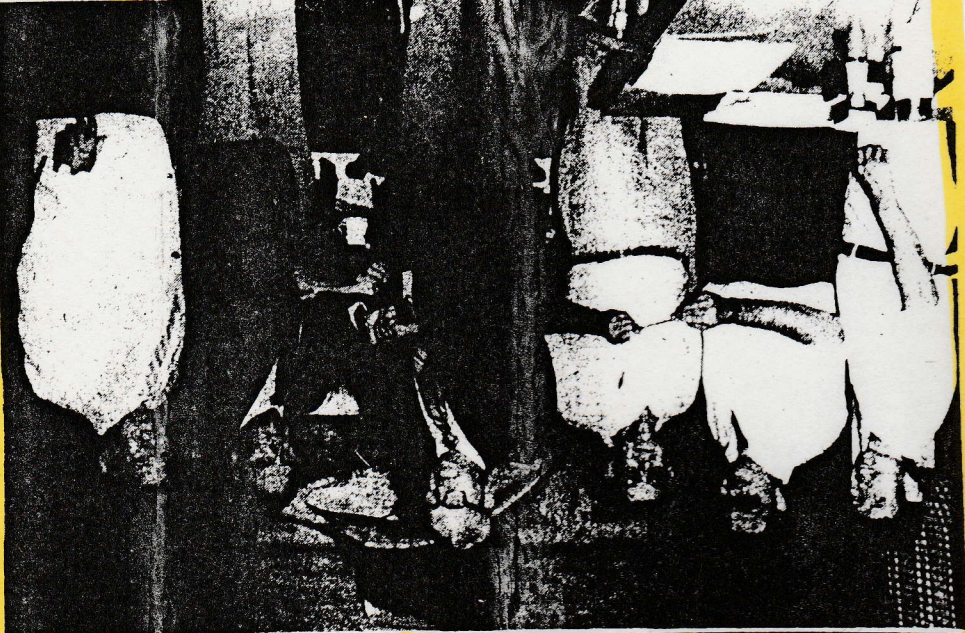
However, Dolphins owner Joe Robbie wants nothing to do with arbitration.

"We are unwilling to submit to binding arbitration by outsiders who know little or nothing about our business or about the amount of compensation professional athletes should receive," he said.

Robbie has said he would not resume talks until Marino is in report without a new contract. Robbie said his last offer was comparable to one given to San Francisco 49ers quarterback Joe Montana — a six-year contract worth an estimated \$1.3 million annually.

Marino has been fined \$4,000 since walking off the practice field and faces a \$200 fine for each additional day away. He is due to return to the team in the third year of a four-year deal that pays him \$2 million.

Soviet Union To Have Team At Seoul Summer Olympics

TOKYO (AP) — The Soviet Union, which led a Communist bloc boycott of the Los Angeles Olympics, will have a team at the 1988 Summer Games in Seoul, South Korea, one of its key officials said Friday.

Leonid Lavrenko, the top spokesman of the Soviet Communist Party's Central Commission for External Relations, said the Soviet Olympic delegation will be announced in the next few days. He said the Soviet Union and most of its allies boycotted last year's Olympic Games in Los Angeles, giving as the main reason what they said was insufficient security for their athletes.

North Korea, separated from the Olympic quarter. Lee Yong-bo earlier Friday rejected the proposal, calling it "an absurd political bid," and said it would require altering competition in both Koreas.
