Volunteer Opportunities

Puppy Raiser: Puppies are placed in host homes for a year until they are old enough for formal guide dog training. Puppy raisers teach basic obedience, house manners and socialize the dog in the community.

Breeding Stock Host: Leader Dog's sophisticated breeding program relies on volunteers to house dogs on a continual basis. Families that host female breeding stock also care for their pupples during whalping and the first six weeks of life.

On-Campus Volunteer: Volunteers work in every department on Leader Dog's campus caring for cogs, answering phones assisting clients and more.

Guide Dog Training

Since 1939, Leader Dog has operated one of the world's most respected and innovative guide dog programs. The free, 26-day residential training program welcomes clients who are legally blind, at least 16 years old, have good orientation and mobility skills and are able to care for their dog.

Training is personalized for each client. Thanks to sophisticated breeding, puppy raising and dog training programs, Leader Dog is able to match clients with a dog that best fits their lifestyle, travel pace,



physical size, stamina and other considerations. Clients have the opportunity to train with their guide dog in a wide variety of situations to fit their current and future needs, including urban, suburban and rural locations; college campuses; busy stores and malls and other environments.

Deaf-Blind

In 1991, Leader Dog became the first organization to provide guide dogs specifically for clients who are both deaf and blind. These dogs are assessed for maturity and receive special training focused on partner awareness and traffic/street crossing.

Instruction for clients who are both deaf and blind is provided via American Sign Language, either tactile or visual, based on a client's range of vision.

It's more crucial than ever for me to have a Leader Dog because I now have hearing loss and my dog helps if I don't hear an approaching car. Traffic concerns are huge for me because I need to be able to get to work so Lean put food on the table for my wife and daughter.—William Herzler

Accelerated O&M Training

The first seven-day residential orientation and mobility [0&M] program empowers people by providing the skills needed to travel safely using a white cane in a much shorter t meframe than traditional 0&M programs. 0&M training is the first step toward becoming an independent traveler.

Being able to orient myself will give me much more confidence traveling at night. When you have night blindness, you become tike Condevelle and run home when it gets dark outside.

Training focuses on cane skills and maintaining orientation while traveling, and it is provided on a 1:1 client-to-instructor ratio and is personalized for each client's individual needs and capabilities.

The training is provided free of charge to

anybody who is legally blind and at leas. 16 years of age, regardless of whether or not they plan to eventually train with a guide dog.



GPS Technology

Clients receive and are instructed in the use of a free GPS device that provides location, direction, street name, nearby points of interest and other information.



This technology empowers clients to identify their current location and plan their own travel, rather than relying on others to fill this need.

GPS technology allows people to travel further and explore new destinations.
